News from the Year Teams

Year 3

We are all looking forward to 3Q's assembly this afternoon.

We had an awesome Egyptian Day this week, full of creativity, fun, and fantastic learning! The children immersed themselves in a range of exciting activities, including drama, art, and history. From acting out life in ancient Egypt to designing their own Egyptian portrait and learning about the lives of pharaohs and the people of ancient Egypt, everyone got stuck in with great enthusiasm. A huge thank you to all families for the effort put into the incredible costumes – they truly brought the day to life!

In English, we have begun exploring a National Geographic Kids article to discover the fascinating process of Egyptian mummification. Using what we've learned, we will soon begin crafting our very own top-secret, step-by-step guides on how to turn an ordinary person into a perfect mummy, fit for the afterlife. Next week, in maths, we'll be revisiting addition and subtraction, focusing on solving problems with up to 3-digit numbers using both mental strategies and jottings to build fluency and confidence.

Our design and technology lessons have introduced the concept of shell structures, laying the foundation for designing and creating our own unique seed packages. In PE, we've been developing our teamwork and problem-solving skills through a variety of engaging challenges. Meanwhile, in PSHE, the children have taken on the role of safety detectives, working hard to identify and label potential hazards in different situations. Mrs Brown (in 3Q) and the EARA group have set an exciting competition to design a Manor Junior school diversity logo - entries are due in by 4th July.

Year 4

Year 4 have really been enjoying their Ruthless Romans topic over the last few weeks. We have had some fascinating conversations about Roman military tactics and what life was like in Roman Britain. The children have also learnt about Boudicca and how her Celtic army fought against the Romans. In reading lessons, we have been having a go at reading the speech that Boudicca reportedly gave to her troops at the time. This has been great practice as the children will now be having a go at writing their own speeches as Boudicca using lots of emotive language, rhetorical questions and repetition to persuade their troops to fight for them! We have also looked at famous wartime speeches by Winston Churchill and Queen Elizabeth I this term to inspire this writing.

We have now started our new topic, 'It's What's Inside That Counts', which bridges both Science and DT. The children have been learning about the different food groups and the nutrients that they provide. They have looked at the 'Eatwell Plate' and considered how to design a healthy, balanced meal. We are looking forward to designing and making our own pizzas later this term and will be tasting some pizzas next week (please ensure you have let us know if your child has any relevant allergies or intolerances). The children will be inviting you in to taste and evaluate their pizzas at our Pizza Picnic – this will be at 2:30pm on Wednesday 16th July if you would like to add it to your diary (more details to follow soon).

The MTC might be complete, but our times tables practice continues so that everyone is well prepared for the Year 5 maths curriculum. Any practice that you can do at home will still be really valuable. Your child's Multiplication Tables Check result will be included in the same envelope as their end of year report. It is then your choice whether you would like to share this with your child. Please remember that this is just one small measure of your child's achievement this year and should be read alongside all of the other information in their report.

Don't forget that next Tuesday 1st July is Roman Day in Year 4! The children are invited to dress up as Romans (or Celts) for the day. Please ask if you would like any help with this.

Year 5

I just wanted to start off with a MASSIVE well done to all of the children Year 5 for their positive attitude and hard work towards their testing in the last few weeks. All of the children should be very proud of their achievements, we certainly are!

Well done to all of the Year 5 children who took part in the music concert, you were an inspiration to us all. It has been lovely to see so many children getting involved in music. Remember, we still have a few spaces for Rock Steady and for music lessons next year if your child is interested at all.

Year 5 have had the pleasure of doing a workshop with NSPCC this week on how to keep themselves safe. We learnt about Buddy and different people we can speak to if we have any worries. Year 5 have been lucky enough to have Miss Torbet teaching them to play the Flute every Monday, which they are all enjoying. They are learning how to make a sound using the flute mouth piece and playing a simple tune.

In English, we have just finished our writing on 'The man who walked the towers'. All of Year 5 really impressed us with how far their writing has come this year, including their use of punctuation. Year 5 are excited to share the stories they wrote with their buddies in a few weeks' time.

In history, we have been studying Islamic history. This week we had a picture hunt in the sensory garden to try and guess what the inventions were and in groups we chose an area of Islamic history to research and present.

During PE lessons, we have been lucky enough to be learning a range of different sports including cricket, rounders and La Crosse. The children have shown that they can adapt their striking and fielding skills to a range of different sports.

Just a reminder that homework is still due in on a Friday each week. Alongside this, children should still be completing their reading, spelling shed and TTRS homework.

Year 6

The play rehearsals have finally begun! With only 3 weeks to go until Production day we are fully immersing ourselves in all things theatrical! Our first cast read through went really well and it was obvious that the children have been practising their lines, they now 'just' need to memorise them! We are looking to borrow four small suitcases: child-play ones would be best. Please email if you have one that we could borrow. Our Big Business project has launched and after some market research using our school community we have decided on our products. With a small budget we have placed our orders for materials, so we are nearly ready to begin manufacturing. Next, we will need to make some prototypes to pass quality-control checks, then test our market to try to calculate supply and demand, before mass production begins. Some budding entrepreneurs are amongst us!

In English we have continued to study the popular book of 'Holes' and have almost completed our writing portfolios for teacher assessment. You will be notified of all SATs results and these teacher assessments around mid-July.

In maths we are continuing to up our standards of understanding in fractions and to continue to revise and improve on previous topics as part of our spiral curriculum. Getting secondary school ready is also on our radar.

Also over the last few weeks each class will be going over to the Infant School to support Reception children with their reading. The enthusiasm of our Y6 pupils has been amazing to see and the positive comments from adults and even the younger pupils has been so lovely to hear. Year 6 - a real credit to our school!
