tributary	A small river or stream that meets a large river.
mouth	Where the river enters the sea.
erosion	Erosion occurs when the fastest currents in the river carve intensely into the banks.
deposition	Rocks and sediments eroded from one part of the river are deposited in another part.
symbol	An object or picture that represents something else.
sculpture	Sculpture is a form of three-dimensional art which you can see everywhere. It can be made from many different materials such as stone, clay, wood or metal.

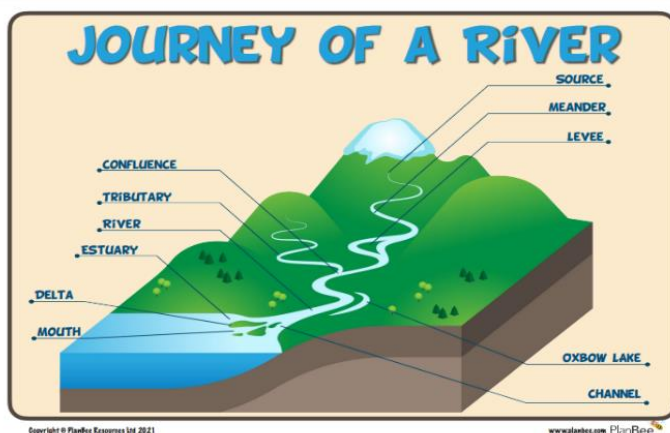
What do you already know about the United Kingdom?
