<p>£10,326.00</p> <p>Employment of Premier Sport Company with the overall aims:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Providing enrichment activities to support small groups of targeted children for various targets including confidence, self-esteem and working as a team • Providing support with after school clubs including Active Manor and athletics to help raise fitness of children. • Providing support at lunchtimes with assisted, more specialized sports, such as archery, rugby and hockey, for children to play • Sports Afternoons with sessions run and organised by Premier Sports to encourage teamwork, active lifestyle and cultural engagement in sport. • CPD for lunchtime staff shadowing coaches 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Improvement in areas such as self-esteem, confidence and fitness for the children who attended. • Increase in children involved with clubs due to extra staff present. Focus on fitness through the clubs selected and children improved their stamina over the duration of the club. • Increase in lunchtime activity for children to help promote active lifestyle. Children are more actively engaged at lunchtimes. Introduction of enrichment sports give opportunities for children to explore and engage in new activities. • Sports Afternoons enabled whole school events which were used to promote active lifestyles and team ethos in events. Children had extra sports that had not been done before as enrichment. Being active was the focus for the sporting afternoon and targeted lower school with schools joining us from the local area. • Lunchtime staff have been given better ideas for active play. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Based on 5 week lessons, rotated every half term. Year group rotations meaning it was 3 sessions a week over one afternoon. • Clubs run twice a week after school each term. • Assisted with two lunch sessions a week for 30 minutes. • Sports Afternoons two sessions summer term. • CPD on rotation throughout year.

<p>£5,155.00</p> <p>Upgrade of PE, Games and play resources with the overall impact of raising standards in PE/Games and helping promote active lifestyles in the school and to promote this as a continuum outside of school</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Building on from last year, the whole area of the games curriculum has been upgraded with new resources to compliment new ideas with our PE and Games curriculum. Athletics, Hockey and Lacrosse have been a particular focus for an upgrade, the latter as an enrichment activity as suggested through pupil voice. Resources have been increased to, where possible, allow children one item each to help maximise skill development during learning. Play equipment has also been upgraded to allow children more choice for active play at lunchtimes with different zones to experience different types of play in.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	58% can swim	Unfortunately, our local leisure centre was closed in 2021 and has still not been rebuilt. This means that we have had to transport our pupils to Yateley Secondary School. The cost of pool hire, swimming teachers and lifeguards is very expensive which means that not as many years groups swim as we would like to. In this current academic year, Year 4 have had 5 sessions of swimming and the total cost for this was £3,789.00
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	58%	
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	70%
