What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	31% can swim	Unfortunately, our local leisure centre was closed in 2021 and has still not been rebuilt. This means that we have had to transport our pupils to Yateley Secondary School. The cost of pool hire, swimming teachers and lifeguards is very expensive which means that not as many years groups swim as we would like to. In this current academic year, Year 4 have had 5 sessions of swimming and the total cost for this was £5,068.50
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	31%	
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	43%
